



What's In A Name?

"The name of the LORD is a strong tower: the righteous runneth into it, and is safe."

Proverbs 18:10

"The names of God are not of human invention, but of divine origin though they are all borrowed from human language, and derived from human and earthly relations" (L. Berkhof, *Systematic Theology*).

Learning the names of God would be a highly beneficial endeavor due to their significance to us according to the following examples:

Matthew Henry says: "The better God is known, the better He is trusted."

Charles Spurgeon says: "By knowing His Name is also meant an experimental acquaintance with the attributes of God, which are every one of them anchors to hold the soul from drifting in seasons of peril."

In short, two reasons to learn His names are to increase faith and escape snares. Knowing His names would conduct power into our lives that addresses particular circumstances.

God wants us to familiarize ourselves with His many names, which exist due to His enormity. According to the follow scripture, knowing His name is powerful:

¹⁴Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him: I will set him on high, because he hath known my name. ¹⁵He shall call upon me, and I will answer him: I will be with him in trouble; I will deliver him, and honour him. Psalm 91:14-15

Applying His names in every day life would prove indispensable. We could pray, sing, worship, and cry out to Him using His names. He loves us being familiar with His names.

People sometimes lift their hands to God because it is a Biblical way to worship. The act expresses, i.e., love, awe, supplication or a need for Him. Blessing God is another reason for raising hands. Raising hands, not a required act, is a demonstration, arising from the heart, of worship of Almighty God. Lifting hands is one way of praising and reaching to God.

The Disciple Jesus Loved

ohn was born in Bethsaida to Zebedee and Salome, who, some say, was the sister of Mary, mother of Jesus. John's brother was James. No evidence in the Bible points to John ever having been married. The Bible tells us that during his life John had occupied himself as a fisherman, disciple of Christ, Apostle and author. People largely agree that John authored the Gospel of John, John I, II, and III, and the Book of Revelation. Four times in the Gospel of John, he calls himself "the disciple Jesus loved." Tradition has it that he outlived the other Apostles and died in Ephesus.

The journey begins when Jesus called the brothers to follow him as they worked as fishermen on the Sea of Galilee. They exited their boat and left their father to follow Him.

A glance at John in this story reveals him to have been faithful. John, along with others, accompanied Jesus during the healing of Jairus' daughter, at the Garden of Gethsemane, and on the mount of transfiguration. He was present during the trial of Jesus in the high priest's house. John is recorded as the only Apostle having been present at the crucifixion of Jesus.



In a way, John's life proved a life of contrast. John joined Peter after Pentecost to boldly declare the Gospel in Jerusalem. As a result, he was beaten and incarcerated. Due to the persecution of Christians, John was banished to the Isle of Patmos, twenty miles off Turkey, a rocky place where criminals were sent to die. Nevertheless, he turned defeat into victory: from beatings and jail to Bible authorship and divine visions. Trials will come just because we are children of God. Let us follow the Apostle John in turning trials into triumph.

Wisdom Literature

With the ancient is wisdom; and in length of days understanding. Job 12:12

Wisdom literature in the Bible consists primarily of the books of Job, Proverbs, and Ecclesiastes. Topics relate largely to human endeavors, suffering, struggles, and every-day living. The wisdom books deal little with historical facts The author of Job is unknown. Job is thought to be the oldest book in the Bible, dealing with human suffering, which comes with God's permission. Solomon wrote much of Proverbs; others contributed as the sayings were collected over time by a group of men. That Proverbs is significant is exemplified by the fact that Jesus and His followers quoted it. This book shows people how to live, using sayings that point out actions to emulate or shun. Most attribute Ecclesiastes to the authorship of Solomon. He outlines activities he thought would lead to happiness and concludes the only way to happiness is to "Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man." While the wisdom literature books were written to instruct the Jewish community in living their lives, the teachings are relevant and conducive to modern-day Christians.
